The five principles of spiritual development

- 2. To be involved in corporate (group) activities with others.
- 3. To understand the world around them.
- 4. To help create a more tolerant and caring society.
- 5. To discover the need for spiritual reflection.

World Faith Activity Badge

Whilst **#ScoutingAtHome** spend some time discovering the true meaning to the world's different faiths, so you can find common ground in your personal relationships with others. Some activities will count towards your World Faith Activity Badge

Look in depth at one particular faith that you are not familiar with:

- ⊕ Use the internet (safely) to explore a place of worship for that faith.
- Research the history of that place of worship.
- Find out the differences between this building and place of worship of other religions.
- Discover how this faith practiced in the UK and elsewhere in the world.
- Examine how following the teachings this particular faith affects an individual's daily life. This could include food or dietary laws, rituals, prayers and worship, or religious observances.

Explore more world faiths

- Learn about the life of a founder or a prominent leader of the faith. You could learn about people like Prince Siddhartha Gautama, Mohammed, or Jesus Christ.
- \$\text{\psi}\$ Study a saint such as St George, a Pope, or Reformer or someone whose faith has had a significant impact upon their life and wider society.
- Read a text from a faith that you are not familiar with and reflect how this compares to your own faith, beliefs and values.

Think about how you might present and share your findings and to what audience. This could link with other badges such as Digital Citizen Staged Activity Badge.
